Dear family and friends,

1SG Bodecker and I would like to highlight the Medical Platoon this month. Their efforts have helped to ensure our success. Soldiers will fight harder if they know they will receive the best medical care available. This fact holds true for all Red Currahe's. The Medical Platoon is comprised of a Doctor, Physicians Assistant, Medical Platoon Leader, 12 Non-Commissioned Officers, and 29 soldiers. 4 Medics (soldiers) are attached to each company to provide immediate treatment for all wounds sustained during missions. Our aid station can only provide level I care. This means that their main focus is stabilizing the serious patients and prepare them for ATR MEDIVAC, which transports the wounded soldiers via helicopter to facilities that can offer higher levels of care.

Our medical platoon not only provides care to 1/506th but to all attachments including the Iraqi Army and Iraqi Police. Care and treatment of patients unable to speak English does present some problems. The Medical Platoon is forced to communicate with these patients through the use of an interpreter.

In 10 months of combat, the Medical Platoon has treated over 199 battle related injuries and over 411 non-battle injuries. In addition to providing lifesaving treatment, the Medical Platoon also provides daily sick call for all soldiers assigned to TP Red Currahe. To date they have treated over 1,283 sick call patients. In addition to providing care, the medical platoon has also re-certified over 500 Eagle First Responders.

The Medical Platoon is the pride and joy of the battalion. I have personally observed the Medical Platoon treat and care for several seriously wounded soldiers. Their professionalism, skill and knowledge is unparalleled. Every Soldier, Sailor and Marine in our Task Force is 100% confident that if he or she needs medical care, it is never far away. 1SG Bodecker and I would especially like to thank the Non-Commissioned Officers for their steadfastness and their professionalism.

October is here - cool weather at last. We are anxiously anticipating the arrival of the incoming unit here at Combat Outpost (Ramadi). The 25<sup>th</sup> of September marked the first day of Ramadan here in Iraq. Able Company Soldiers are currently conducting operations at ECPB, OP Hotel and force protection at Combat Outpost. In order to strengthen our static positions with more combat power we have decreased our offensive operations. Also, in preparation for the redeployment we have begun to update medical records (vaccines), AKO accounts and flight manifest. Before Ramadan started 1<sup>st</sup> Platoon conducted a four day mission in East Sufia and captured 6 insurgents (Anti Iraqi Forces) and a small cache. 2<sup>nd</sup> Platoon conducted a raid on 8 houses in our area and captured 5 insurgents responsible for IED emplacement. GOOD NEWS... We are on schedule to redeploy to FTCKY in November. Soon, we will be loading our equipment and conducting joint combat patrols with the new unit. Believe me the men are looking forward to reuniting you during Thanksgiving.

### EARLY MORNING DETAINEE YIELDS BIG VICTORY-

Initially, even those residents denied the true identity of the man. With a little bit of tactical questioning, the detainee's brother revealed his brother's true identity. Secured by Doc Stewart, SPC Baro, SPC D'Angelo and SGT Semmedinger, the detainee and his brother were taken back to Camp Corregidor for processing. This small victory in the battle weary Ma'Laab District grew even bigger when interrogators later found out that the Cannibal Platoon's grab was a big wig in an Al Qaeda in Iraq cell located in Ramadi. Great Job Second!

Afterwards, the platoon returned for a day of rest and relaxation in preparation for another cycle out at the Eagles Nest. PFC Timmy Smith and his buddy always to be found nearby, PFC Jimmy Davis were seen frequenting the MWR computers until all hours of the night because of an unrelenting internet addiction.

Our time back out at the Eagles Nest has also been marked with several victories yielding continuous benefits and more insurgents put in jail. The Iraqi Army company, led by several aggressive officers and working alongside Cannibal Platoon, has begun to take the lead in missions aimed at capturing the insurgents trying to run freely in Ramadi and prevent the establishment of peace. This is what God desires for us: that we remain always looking, always searching, always longing. In that looking and longing His hope is that we might find Him. With Him is where our home truly is, where we will find the safety and security, the changeless comfort of a place where we can truly know rest and peace.
